


#### Planning with a Purpose






#### Citizen Perception: Rank of Desirable Projects

#### **Background:**

Named after the family who sold the land to the city in 1971 under the agreement that it remain a wilderness camping area for Boy Scouts. In 1996 the city moved forward with plans to improve the park; thousands of volunteer hours helped in building the park, including efforts from Boy Scouts, local churches, and National Guard Units 116th and 149th. The park was dedicated July 24, 1997 as part of the Utah State Centennial Program. Today it stands just as the Andersons envisioned.

#### **Background:**

A 1976 survey by the BYU Recreation Department evidenced a strong desire in the City for more park and recreation facilities. Promptly, a special July election determined a maximum city bonding package of \$491,000 toward achieving that goal. In that act the groundwork for Battle Creek Park began. Though initially referred to as "Central Park," it was changed to its current name on November 7, 1979. The beautiful trees in the park serve as a reverent reminder of our nations veterans and for families and children affected by Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS).

#### **Background:**

In 1950 a local developer created the Chrisville Development, leaving at its center a vacant lot, with the intent that it become a playground for children. During the 1960's, it was used for a sandlot baseball and little league practice area. The City took over the responsibility of maintenance through the 1990's. Hundreds of volunteer hours have helped in the installation of amenities. Today, Chrisville park is one of the best kept secrets in Pleasant Grove.

#### **Background:**

Manila was the first park developed north of the 200 South corridor. The City acted as the General Contractor and city departments joined forces to install sod, landscaping, and lighting. With a foundation in place, citizens and businesses took over. \$200,000 in donations were raised, materials and tools were gathered, and an army of volunteers—parents, grandparents, children, interested citizens, and whole families—worked 3 shifts: morning, afternoon, and evening. 27,000 hours were logged by volunteers to construct America's largest science and discovery park in just eleven days, completing it on May 11, 1996. The Discovery Park in Manila Park was designed with the theme, "Turning Science into Child's Play." Much of what is there was planned by children. Additional parking lots and restrooms have been installed to accommodate the many visitors.

#### **Background:**

Downtown Park is the oldest park in Pleasant Grove. In 1916 the City began a two year lease agreement with The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. In 1921 the park became know as "Tourist Campgrounds" and was used as a campsite for automobile travelers. Also in 1921, Pleasant Grove hosted the first Strawberry Days Celebration in the park. Pleasant Grove City officially took possession of the park in 1929, with restrooms added in 1956 and the pavilion added in 1979 through generous contributions by the Lions Club.

#### Vision:

The Downtown Park is an important part of the ambiance of downtown and is expected to remain and flourish. An important component of the Downtown Civic Center Master Plan, the park will remain a gathering place for the community and an anchor for downtown.

#### **Background:**

Kiwanis Park's origin dates back to 1967 when Kiwanis club members helped Pleasant Grove City sign an agreement with Utah Power and Light Company to use about 10 acres at the mouth of Battle Creek Canyon. Later in 1983 Kiwanis members, city workers, and the Southam and Warburton Company erected the pavilion we use today. In 2001, Pleasant Grove City purchased the 3.5 acres with the help of The Trust for Public Lands. 

#### History:

Originally built in 1909 as a gym for the Jr. High School, Pleasant Grove's Historic Recreation Center, also known as the Old Rec Center, has been with the City for over a hundred years. In 1982 the Jr. High gymnasium was converted into the city's first multi-purpose recreation center and it wasn't long before the value of the recreation center as an asset to the community was understood. The building proved to be multi-purpose in many respects, housing the Senior Citizen's organization, city fairs, craft boutiques, special events, dances, athletic team practices, league and tournament competitions, and more.

The burden the historic recreation center bore was alleviated in 2008 with the opening of the new Recreation Center. Today the historic building is used for dances, boutiques, family parties, and city events.


