


This Old Bell Schoolhouse -which is the oldest standing school left in Utah was originally built in 1852, but burned in 1860. The adobe was reused to rebuild the school. Other uses were: community and dramatic functions, a place for volunteer fireman to keep their equipment, City's Public Library, and currently used by the DUP as a museum.




The Ellijah Mayhew House

Green Canyon.



Samuel Green's two story soft rock house was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1987. The home remains in the Green Family ownership.




Gothic Revival Style/ Traditional. Soft Rock house was later stuccoed and marked into blocks with corner quoins added.




Jeppa and Anna Nelson came from Denmark to Utah. They built this granary in 1874 over their rock-lined dugout, which they lived in until they could build a house.


Franklin and Elizabeth Beers had this large Italianate-style house built to serve as their family home and the 1st Pleasant Grove Hotel.




The original building was the Clark Mercantile-men's clothing store, then became a grocery store, a hardware business, and currently is the Rosebud Antique store.

John Halliday built this home with its pyrmadal roof, arched windows, gables, porches and eyelid dormer window which is a great example of houses built between 1902 - 1908. This style was found almost exclusively in Utah County. Don Wadley, current owner, is a decendant of John Halliday.




Clifford L. Wright saw this English Tudor Style house in Midvale, Utah and liked it so much that he had it duplicated here in Pleasant Grove.

Blocks of Ice were cut into about four foot cubes. Large Ice Tongs were used to grab the blocks of ice and loaded onto a wagon or large bobsleigh pulled by a team of horses.
